# Seguin's summer tradition returns as River Monsters take the field

(Seguin) – A summertime favorite returns to Seguin tonight as the Seguin River Monsters kick off their 2025 season. The team, made up of collegiate players from across the country, is part of the Texas Collegiate League (TCL). First pitch is set for 7 p.m. at "Smokey" Joe Williams Field.

Team owners Tommy and Kristin Stephens say they're excited to welcome fans back for another season of summer baseball.

"We're expecting a big turnout, so we reached out to the (Victoria) Generals because we're going to play them on Tuesday and Wednesday. They are offering some of their interns to come and help us. We're expecting a big Victoria turnout, because this is a little bit of a rivalry since we're so close to each other. Our fans and the Victoria fans have had a lot of fun in the past with the camaraderie," said Tommy Stephens.

This year's roster includes a mix of returning players and new faces -- and the entertainment won't just be on the field.

"We have three players from the 2023 season that are coming back this year. They were on the championship team in '23. So, we have three of those returners. And then, we have six players from last year returning. So, there's nine. Plus, Kristin and (Dance Team Head Coach) Rhonda (Bloomer) added the Mavens, the dance team. I believe we're up to 10 girls

now," said Tommy Stephens.

The Stephens say building a competitive team is one of the biggest challenges of ownership. Kristin Stephens says they work year-round to help Manager Tony Perez field a strong roster.

"On our website, we have what is called the player form and those kids -- starting in November -- are starting to fill out player forms. Our coach Tony Perez is excellent. So, in the beginning, he is reaching out to coaches and players that he already has a relationship with and whether they played with us or not, he reaches out very early. So, that relationship helps as we build and go through the months. We're still getting player forms turned in today. So, it does not stop... then Tony just chooses the fighters. You know, the ones that really want to keep playing," said Kristin Stephens.

The couple purchased the team last year. It was Tommy's dream, and while neither had experience owning a baseball team, Kristin says they jumped in headfirst without knowing quite what to expect.

"When we decided we were buying a team, we went into this -- I think -- with no expectations at first. We had looked at teams all over the country. And so, coming in -- at least I'm going to speak for myself -there were no expectations," said Kristin Stephens.

After a whirlwind first season, the Stephens say they now have a better sense of what to expect in year two.

"Last year was a challenge. I mean we bought (the team), and we came in. It was like game time, 150 miles an hour each day. We had six rain-out games last year, which you don't expect in South Texas. So, you learn not to expect anything because from day-to-day it is completely different. Our only expectation for this year is to put on a great show, have a great time and just enjoy the game. We hope that everybody has a great time. We hope we keep you cool enough. And at the end of the day, we hope we put up a W," said Kristin Stephens.

Still, there were some unexpected joys. Tommy says they've developed meaningful connections with both players and the Seguin community.

"What we didn't expect were the relationships that we were able to create with the players last year that carried over to this year, (and) that we were able to follow them and go watch them play in other areas. That's been a great experience for us," said Tommy Stephens.

While the Stephens own the team, they say it's the community that really helps make it all work. They're encouraging fans to not only come out and fill the stands -- but also consider getting involved through sponsorships or other types of support.

Kristin says people can help by providing meals for the team or volunteering to host a player in their home.

"We have to feed both teams after the game. So, if there are any restaurants, food trucks, (or) things like that that can feed 75 players and coaches, we still have spots open for that. (We are) also looking for a couple host families," said Kristin Stephens.

If you're interested in helping with meals or hosting, the team makes it easy to sign up -- just reach out and they'll get you connected.

"The best way is to go to seguinrivermonsters@ gmail.com, and just write me a letter...I will get back to them and we'll connect and have a conversation. It's as simple as that," said Kristin Stephens.

Tommy Stephens says the bonds formed between

players and their host families have been one of the most rewarding parts of owning the team. He hopes more people will consider opening their homes this season.

"Last year, one of the biggest experiences that we were able to share with the community was with our host families. I really need to praise them because a lot of them have kids that are playing sports and when these players came into those homes, it was like they automatically have big brothers. So, to see that experience out on the field and how those families supported those players -- even today, and (watch) how those players helped those kids. Because those players will work with those kids at their homes...all through the season. To see that and to see how the relationships are created between our players and the youth and the community -- is exciting to watch," said Tommy Stephens.

And while they're still looking for new sponsors, Kristin Stephens says they're thankful for the many partnerships already supporting the team.

"The Brick (Kitchen & Bar) here in Seguin, Chicken Express and different places like that -- and Bosses (Pizza) out of New Braunfels, will be doing our after-game meals. So, we've got some really great sponsors, but we were looking for a few more to help us out. We're just excited about it. It's more than just... the sponsors. They're important to us, but like Tommy said -- at the end of the day, it's about the relationships that will continue past our season," said Kristin Stephens.

Beyond the baseball, Kristin says the goal is to make River Monsters games fun for everyone.

"We've got a few teams coming out for Field of Dreams this year. They actually get to get on the field with the players, play catch with them and then they get to run out with them during the National Anthem. We do have some people coming out to do the first pitch and we have a couple kids (from the area) that will be singing our National Anthem as well," said Kristin Stephens.



The deal was approved, but not without some concerns raised by the council. Councilman Jim Lievens says the additional costs are a hard pill to swallow.

"Don't get me wrong, I love the project, but \$109,000...is tough to swallow. So, I guess, I'll chalk it up to the COVID or other things," said Lievens.

Reynolds says the project predates her time with the city. She didn't have answers for why the project was delayed for so long, but she assured the council that it was now ready to go.

"That project was given funding based on a bid prior to getting authorization from TXDOT, (and) prior to solidifying all of the locations and sign types. (We were) always anticipating a slight increase, given the number of signs locations and potential permitting challenges with TXDOT. But the delay between 2019 to today is a harder challenge for me to answer," said Reynolds.

The now \$252,000 wayfinding sign project will now be designed and installed by SSC Signs and Lighting. In all, 37 signs will be installed to provide directional information for visitors. It's expected to direct them to popular attractions around the city of Seguin.

# Seguin Police Department looks into possible charges following Little League altercation

(Seguin) -- A youth baseball game meant to inspire teamwork and sportsmanship took a disturbing turn last week when a physical altercation broke out at the Seguin Little League Fields, involving players, coaches, and parents. That's according to Stephanie Larrimore, Seguin PD community engagement officer.

The Seguin Police Department responded to multiple 911 calls around 7:57 p.m. on Tuesday, May 27, 2025, reporting a brawl at the field located at 1123 S. Austin Street. She says witnesses say tensions mounted during the game due to poor sportsmanship, ultimately prompting the umpire to end the match early. What was supposed to be a routine postgame handshake escalated into a physical confrontation after heated words were exchanged.

By the time officers arrived, Larrimore says many of those involved had already begun leaving the scene. Authorities confirmed that no serious injuries were reported on-site.


The Seguin Police Department's Criminal Investigations Division (CID) is now reviewing evidence and witness statements, and charges will be filed based on the outcome of the investigation.

Meanwhile police officials are urging the community to reflect on serving as examples for young athletes. As the summer sports season continues, including the startup of All-Star baseball and softball tournaments, Larrimore says parents and coaches are reminded of their critical role in shaping not only a child's performance but also their character.

"The Seguin Police Department reminds all community members that sports events are intended to foster teamwork, discipline and positive community interaction. We urge everyone to demonstrate good sportsmanship and respect at all times," said Larrimore.



Carl Matthew Stauber, born January 18, 1933, in Tacoma Park, Maryland, passed away peacefully on April 14, 2025, at the age of 92. At the time of his passing, Carl resided in Argent Court, Seguin, Texas. Carl leaves behind a legacy of adventure, craftsmanship, friendship and love.

When Carl was 12 his mother died and he

moved to Alma Center, Wisconsin to live with his Uncle Harold and Aunt Martha. It was there he discovered his lifelong passion for the great outdoors.

Carl's career as a cartographer started when he joined the United States Air Force in Intelligence. He served his country proudly during the Korean War. He worked for the USGS for many years. In 1957 he married Elaine Barker.

A gifted woodworker, Carl created beautiful furniture, and craft pieces for Elaine to paint, and later in life mastering the art of turning bowls and platters on his lathe.

His love for the outdoors led him to become an accomplished marksman, winning numerous state and regional trap shooting championships, often with his beloved wife, Elaine, by his side. Carl's skill as a waterfowl hunter was renowned from the Chesapeake Bay to the wilds of Canada and Alaska. If Carl wasn't hunting or shooting at clay birds he was fishing. He fished lakes, rivers, streams, the ocean; and if he thought it might have a fish in it, he was going to wet a hook and give it his best, which was outstanding. And somehow Carl found enough time for golf and reading too.

But traveling in a camper with Elaine and their poodle, Taffy, may have brought him the most joy. Carl found immense joy in meeting new friends at every campground, his gift for storytelling captivating audiences with tales of his adventures in growing up in the Wisconsin woods, hunting, fishing, sailing, and shooting. Carl's friendly and resourceful nature, coupled with his loyalty and knack for finding good in others, made him a cherished friend across generations.

Carl was preceded in death by his parents, Carl John Stauber and Milda Van Gordon Stauber, his sister Marie Stauber Pappas, his brother Van Gordon Stauber, and his beloved wife, Elaine B Stauber of almost 56 years. He is survived by numerous nieces and nephews. He was a devoted Catholic and loved his church community.

A visitation will be held on Wednesday, June 4, at 10:00 am at St. James Catholic Church, followed by a Mass of Christian Burial at 10:30 am, with the Rev. Greg Nevlud officiating. A reception will follow. Interment will take place at a later date in East Lawn Cemetery, Alma Center, Wisconsin.

#### CDC Says New COVID Strain From China Has Arrived In U.S.

(Atlanta, GA) -- The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention says a new COVID-19 strain, responsible for a large surge in China, has arrived in the U.S. It's an Omicron variant known as NB181 and has been detected through airport screening programs for international travelers. The first cases here showed up here in late March and early April producing symptoms similar to earlier COVID strains. The CDC says a handful of cases have been confirmed in New York, California, Rhode Island, Virginia, Ohio, Washington and Hawaii.

#### **RFK Blocking Government Scientist From Publishing In Journals**

(Undated) -- Health and Human Services Secretary Robert F. Kennedy Jr. is considering a move to ban government scientists from publishing in leading medical journals. During a podcast appearance, Kennedy Jr. said Lancet, the New England Journal of Medicine, JAMA and other journals "are all corrupt." Although the publications are consistently ranked as the top medical journals in the world, Kennedy alleged they are "vessels" for pharmaceutical companies. Kennedy is proposing for agencies within HHS to create their own "inhouse" journals that will become the preeminent journals in their field.

#### Study: U.S. Moms Are Struggling With Mental Health


(New York, NY) -- A new study says three-fourths of all moms in the U.S. are struggling with some degree of mental health issues. The study published Tuesday by Columbia University looked at nearly 200-thousand mothers over a seven-year period, and found only 25 percent reporting "excellent" mental health. That's down from 38 percent in 2016. The study also showed declines in physical health among U.S. mothers, especially among those who were single, younger, less educated and whose children were multi-racial or uninsured.

#### New Ultrasound Tool to Treat Liver Cancer Gaining Popularity

(Grand Rapids, MI) -- Michigan-based Corewell Health is now using a cutting-edge ultrasound device to treat certain liver cancers, and early results are promising. The technology, developed by HistoSonics out of the University of Michigan, uses focused sound waves to destroy tumors without harming nearby tissue. Approved by the FDA last year, it's currently cleared for liver cancer but could expand to other organs like the kidney and pancreas. Doctors say the treatment is non-invasive, highly precise, and well tolerated by patients. Corewell is one of just 30 hospitals nationwide offering the procedure.




