






Girls' Basketball Achieves State Recognition

This year, the Hancock Public Schools Sports Hall of Fame is proud to induct **Chuck Lucchesi**, a distinguished alumnus from the Class of 1962, whose athletic prowess spanned multiple sports and continued at the collegiate and professional levels, complemented by a lifetime of dedication to the Hancock community.

Chuck was a standout athlete for Hancock High School, notably excelling in football where he played tackle on both offense and defense. He earned All-Conference honors in his junior and senior years and was the leading tackler for the undefeated 1961 Bulldogs. Beyond football, Chuck lettered for three years on the track team. His youth hockey career also saw remarkable success, including playing for the Lauren Grove Pee Wee and Juvenile teams that won three consecutive Michigan state championships, earning him all-tournament team recognition as a defenseman. He was also a member of the Dollar Bay VFW hockey team that clinched the U.S. Pee Wee Championship tournament in 1959.

Following his exceptional high school career, Chuck continued his football journey at Michigan Tech University, playing both ways and helping the Huskies win two Northern Intercollegiate championships. He was a two-time All-Conference selection and named Most Valuable Defensive Player two years in a row, ultimately earning a spot on the All-America Division II football team. His collegiate achievements led to his induction into the MTU Hall of Fame in 1996. In 1966, Chuck made history as the only known Bulldog football player to sign a professional contract with the Houston Oilers. He also continued his football career with Ladish in Wisconsin, where he made the league's All-Star Team.

Chuck's dedication to all sports at HCH—whether playing, supporting, or cheering them on makes him an outstanding candidate deserving of this honor. He often shares that his coaches and teachers at HCH pushed and inspired him to achieve both athletic and business success, and he has been happy to reciprocate by supporting all of Hancock sports' success throughout his lifetime.
